Variance request for the development on South Morgan and Glenn Street

Discussion: Councilman Bonin stated he would like the general public to address the council tonight about their concerns.

Colleen Faul resides at 407 South St. Pierre. Mrs. Faul stated they are building 5 houses on 3 city lots. This will fall right behind her home. She will no longer have privacy in her own backyard if they have windows on the back side of these 2 story homes. She has a special needs child with a lot of different behaviors and chosen activities. She would like the council to consider looking at the back exposure. Maybe they could have the developer not place any windows on the back side. She does not understand why they will only have 6 feet between each house, when their houses have 10 feet between each one. Why the dense placement? Mayor Bourque questioned the engineer about how many houses will be placed there? Walter stated in the request for the waivers they initially were going to put 6 units and now it is 5 units. They are also asking for

waivers in reference to sidewalks on Glenn Street and Morgan Street. They have also requested an additional waiver of the setbacks and the drainage and utility easement. They requested a waiver for the fillets on Glenn Street. They are requesting parallel parking on Morgan Street. Walter stated there must be 2 parking spots along Morgan Street. They are requesting a side set-back to the property line of 5 feet, which is zero lot lines which means you push one wall to the property line and the other to 6 feet. They are moving the lot lines over in order to avoid putting firewalls. Mayor Bourque stated they came back with 5 buildings which are camel back, shot gun 2 story homes, with potential rear facing windows. Walter stated they still have to provide second layer information permission/variance in the Old Town Overlay District. They have to provide 4 parking spots on Morgan Streets to meet the Old Town Overlay District requirements. Mayor Bourque explained the Old Town Overlay District is layered to provide protection to the older part of town. Councilman Bonin questioned how many variances are they requesting? Walter stated 5 variances.

Judy Keefe resides at 409 South St Pierre. She questioned about the right of way on Glenn and Morgan. Walter stated some of the variances were presented to the Planning Commission, but they have to be approved by the council. The standard open ditch is a 60-foot right of way and curb, and gutter is 50 feet. They are asking for a 15 feet utility and sidewalk easement. Walter stated the public works director asked for the bigger utility easement to keep everything the way it is. Mrs. Keef stated it will be irreversible if we approve any variances. The city already has issues with turn off of Glenn Street onto Morgan. That entrance needs to be wider. Mrs. Keefe asked if that will be addressed. Mayor Bourque stated we have to improve that intersection. Mrs. Keefe stated we are talking about the ambiance of the old town Broussard, and the idea of density is tight. She also added they went from 4 houses to 5. She didn't think that would fit the character of the street, 4 will not 5.

Michael Keefe resides at 409 South St. Pierre. He stated parking is already a problem. Five new structures will cause more problems for emergency vehicles, fire trucks and garbage trucks. He doesn't want an overflow of traffic, and the neighbors are really concerned about that. Mayor Bourque stated we do need to make improvements to Glenn Street. Mel stated we can do it; but we do not have the right of way. Councilwoman Girouard questioned when the single stories were built, did it bring a traffic problem? Walter stated it did, but we didn't have the Old Town District then. Then we felt the need to address this. Councilman Bonin presented the council pictures he took today of the traffic situation in that area. Just one person parking on the roadway on Glenn Street caused major congestion.

Madison Balbosa addressed the council She stated she grew up in Broussard. It is turning into an overpass town and losing its magic. She doesn't want Broussard to lose the magic.

Lynn Balbosa did not address the council, but she is opposed to this.

George Duhon, questioned about the parallel parking on Morgan St and parking behind the buildings. Morgan Street is a very heavy traveled road. Has a traffic study been done for this? Walter stated the traffic will turn off of Morgan onto an alley way behind the complex to park. The alley way will come out on Glenn Street, it will be a one-way alley, and it is not enough for a traffic study. Councilman Bonin asked the Fire Department to address these concerns about the alley way. Deputy Chief Denais stated he knows this area and he understands everyone's concerns, because he grew up in that area. Question, can they get a fire truck off of Glenn and Morgan? Deputy Chief Denais stated yes, they can. It will not be a public safety problem because wherever they park, they will be able to provide services. Councilman Bonin questioned how will it affect the PIAL Rating? Deputy Chief Denais stated it will not affect it.

Councilman Bonin stated at first, they were building 3 houses and now it is 5. He has 40 letters from 40 citizens opposing this, so he will do what they requested him to do. Councilwoman Racca stated she has the same thoughts as Councilman Bonin. Mr. Cliff Guidry approached the council, representing the landowner and stated the owner has agreed to remove the rear windows. He understands the 6-foot line might be a little narrow, and if they did 4 complexes it would have more green space. If they change the aesthetics of the development, they will have to get approval again. Walter stated if they have to go back to the Planning Commission, there not will a charge. Cliff stated one-way signs will be posted and he feels everything will go in the same direction. Mayor Bourque stated we still need to improve that intersection without a fillet. Walter stated we will need additional fillet. From the edge of the asphalt the radius is 17 % feet wide. Walter stated we would have to widen the pavement and increase the flares which will come close to the ditches for a certain length. Mayor Bourque stated some residents asked for a commitment and that is what he wants to do. Councilman Bourque stated it will cost money and he doesn't feel the city should pay for this. Councilman Delahoussaye stated we would be widening the road, and the developer can build his complex. He feels this is a positive side for everyone. Walter stated the vast majority parking will be in the rear of the development. All the parking is in the alley except the 2 spaces in the front. Walter stated our ordinances states 2 spots per home according to the Old Town Overlay District. Colleen Faul questioned if it is beneficial for emergency parking to use public parking spaces? D/C Denais stated they are capable of parking emergency vehicles in the rear of the building. Councilman Bonin questioned how far will we put culverts to widen Glenn Street? Walter stated putting it just 4 or 5 feet will make a difference. Councilwoman Girouard questioned if we can break up the waiver for a vote? Councilman Regan stated as long as he has been on the council he has never encountered opposition from citizens like this on an item. He understands the concerns of everyone, and he feels we need to protect those 40+ citizens. That is why he is recommending we table this and go back and have a committee meeting about this and study the public safety issue. Mr. Balbesi addressed the council. He stated at first, he was going to build 3 homes for his family with 5

families in them. Councilwoman Girouard stated this is in her district and her constituents trust her to represent them. She will do what is best for the quality of living and break up what is right for him and the people who live there. Walter stated in the Old Town Overlay he could put that sort of complex and it would have to be single family residential. Councilman Delahoussaye also recommended it be tabled. Mayor Bourque stated they can meet and work with the developer through each waiver and then come back to the council for approval.

Morgan Hicks who resides at 405 South St. Pierre, questioned what does tabling it mean? Mayor Bourque explained no action will be taken tonight and they have 30 days to come back on the agenda for council approval again. Nothing will be done behind closed doors.

Discussion: Joseph Marino addressed the council. Joseph stated this is a Main Street Project that will run through the heart of Broussard. Joseph showed pictures of catch basins and drainage that needs to be re-done in the downtown. The sidewalks are also crumbling and are not ADA Compliant. This project will also allow us to gain more offstreet parking. They will be taking out the old cast iron water lines to help the declutter. Also, Centerpoint Energy will abandon the main gas and move the service to the side streets. Right now, Main at Morgan is kind of bumpy with the asphalt, but we are fixing that in all four directions. Mayor Bourque stated we will also fix the sidewalks to the railroad tracks. Joseph stated he doesn't think that it is in the budget. Mayor Bourque stated 95% of the drainage will be getting changed out. There will be a nice crossing after the church with ADA Compliant sidewalks and continued lighting spaced out. Beyond the infrastructure we will be spending money on a beautification stain at the intersection, with the sugar mill wheels design. Across from Coastal there will be open gears made from fiberglass embedded in the ground and painted. This will tie into the 6-foot sidewalks. The old Iron Horse Ring is in front of the House of Broussard, we will put that on a bronze plaque with a story. Behind the City Hall, where the water plant building is, after that building is demolished, we will reconfigure it to add cement. This will be more parking for the city and for events such as Noel' Broussard. The sidewalk will connect to Main Street. Arceneaux Park will also have a new sign. Mayor Bourque stated the ordinance is currently listed as Phase 2A, 2B and 2C. Because the beatification will fall in different areas of the project, we will adjust that for the final meeting at adoption. Councilman Bonin questioned about the trees near Morgan and Main; is that shrubs? Joseph stated it is low maintenance shrubs. Joseph stated we might lose one parking spot at the corner, but we will be gaining more parking with offstreet parking. Joseph stated there will also be no more loose gravel. Mayor Bourque stated there will be more planned meetings. We have to cater to the homeowners and the business owners downtown. Joseph stated we will also be doing the project a section at a time not to affect certain parts of town all at one time.

ORDINANCE NO. 24-808

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BROUSSARD, LOUISIANA AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES TO ADD SECTION 62-103 RELATING TO PEDDLERS, SOLICITORS AND VENDORS

The City Council of the City of Broussard, Louisiana, meeting in regular session with a quorum being present, after due deliberation and discussion, and having considered the best interest and welfare of the public and the citizens of Broussard, adopted the following Ordinance:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Broussard finds that there is a need to supplement the Broussard Code of Ordinances by adopting an ordinance for regulation of peddlers, solicitors, and vendors.

THEREFOR, BE IT ORDAINED that the Code of Ordinances of the City of Broussard be and is hereby amended and supplemented to add Section 62-103, including Sections 62-103(a) through 62-103(j) all as shown on the attached Exhibit A which is made a part hereof by reference.

PEDDLERS, SOLICITORS, AND VENDORS

Sec. 62-103. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

City means the City of Broussard.

Door to door vendor means all persons and entities, as well as their agents, representatives and employees, who offer for sale or rental any goods, merchandise or services of any kind or character or exhibiting the same for sale or rental, or exhibiting the same for the purpose of taking orders for the sale or rental thereof and for the purpose of selling, offering for sale or exhibiting the same for the purpose of taking orders for the sale or rental thereof to engage in door-to-door solicitation.

Major Holidays means New Year Eve, New Years Day, Martin Luther King Jr.=s Birthday, Mardi Gras, Washington=s Birthday, Good Friday, Easter, Memorial Day, Juneteenth National Independence Day, Independence Day(July 4th), Labor Day, Columbus Day, Halloween, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

Peddler means all persons and entities, as well as their agents, representatives and employees, who offer for sale or rental any goods, merchandise or services along a street or by going door to door.

Solicitor means all persons and entities, as well as their agents, representatives and employees, who offer for sale or rental any goods, merchandise or services along a street or by going door to door.

Sec. 62-103(a) Violations; penalty.

Any person or entity violating any provisions of this article shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine not exceeding \$300.00 or imprisonment for a term not exceeding 30 days, or both. Each instance of any violation of this article shall be considered a separate offense. Each day any violation continues shall constitute a separate violation.

Sec. 62-103(b). Limitation of right to go onto private property.

The practice of going in or upon private property by peddlers, solicitors, and door-to-door vendors for the purpose of selling or renting goods, merchandise, or services, or for the purpose of taking orders for the sale or rental of goods, merchandise, or services of any kind and character, except as specified and permitted in this article, is prohibited and declared to be a nuisance.

Sec. 62-103(c). Invitation required for going onto private property.

Any peddler, solicitor, or vendor possessing the permit required by section 62-103(e) may go onto private property for the purpose of selling, renting or soliciting for sale or rental of any goods, merchandise or services only between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. each day, Monday through Friday, without specific invitation of the owner or occupant of such property. At all other times on Monday through Friday, all times on Saturday and Sunday and all times on major holidays, no such peddler, solicitor or vendor may go upon private property unless an appointment for such visit has been made by telephone or letter prior to the actual time of the visit. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this article, peddlers, solicitors and vendors may not go upon any private property which displays a "No Trespassing" or ANo Soliciting@ sign which prohibits solicitations, or otherwise conveys that door-to-door solicitations are forbidden or unwelcome, unless an appointment was made by telephone or letter prior to the actual time of the visit.

Sec. 62-103(d). Exemptions.

This article is not and shall not be applicable to the selling, or offering for sale, of any goods, merchandise or services, or exhibiting the same for sale or for the purpose of taking orders for, the sale thereof with reference to:

- (1) Any elementary, high school, community college or university-sponsored fundraising activity, or any activity involving an organization or association of school-age children such as, but not limited to, the Boy or Girl Scout;.
- (2) Any church fundraising activity or any activity involving an organization or association of a church such as, but not limited to, the Knights of Columbus.

Sec. 62-103(e). Permit-Required.

It shall be unlawful for any peddler, solicitor or door-to-door vendor to offer for sale or rental, exhibit for sale or rental, or exhibit for the purpose of taking orders for sale or rental, any goods, merchandise or services without first obtaining a permit from the city.

Sec. 62-103(f). Same-Fee.

The city shall issue a permit authorizing an individual or entity to sell or rent, exhibit for sale or rent, offer for sale or rental, or exhibit for the purpose of taking orders for sale or rental, from the location identified on the permit or on a door-to-door basis, the goods, merchandise or services, only after such peddler, solicitor or door-to-door vendor has fully complied with the provisions of this article and has paid the sum of \$200.00 for the issuance of such permit. Notwithstanding the foregoing, any individual or entity utilizing a cart or operating a booth at a festival, fair or parade shall instead pay a permit fee of \$25.00 per day for each cart or booth, and the additional fee required by section 62-103(k).

Sec. 62-103(g). Same-Conditions for issuance.

- (a) Application required. The peddler, solicitor or door-to-door vendor shall make an application to the city no less than ten days prior to the date of the contemplated sale, rental or exhibit to be held, which application shall be in a form prescribed by the city, and which shall include, but not be limited to, the following information:
 - (1) The full name and address of the applicant;
 - (2) The location of his or its principal office and place of business;
 - (3) The location from which the applicant will sell, lease, exhibit for sale or lease, offer for sale or lease or exhibit for the purpose of taking orders for the sale or lease of his or its goods, merchandise or services, or a statement that the activity will ne only on a door-to-door basis;
 - (4) The name and address of each assistant, associate or employee who will work for and under the applicant; and
 - (5) The names and addresses of the applicant's officers, partners, members or principals.
- (b) Supporting information, bond required. The application for a permit must be accompanied by:
 - (1) A statement showing the kind and character of the goods, merchandise or services to be sold, leased, offered for sale or lease or exhibited;
 - (2) A certified copy of the charter, if the applicant is a corporation;
 - (3) A certified copy of its articles of partnership or articles of organization for a limited liability company, if the applicant is a partnership or limited liability company;
 - (4) The documents forming or organizing the entity if the entity is not a corporation, partnership or limited liability company;
 - (5) Valid state issued driver=s license or valid state issued identification card.
 - (6) A statement as to whether or not the applicant has been convicted of any crime, misdemeanor or violation of any municipal or parish/county ordinance, the nature of the offense and the punishment or penalty assessed;

(7) A bond in the sum of not less than \$5,000.00 which shall be executed by the applicant as principal, with one or more good and sufficient sureties satisfactory to the city, which bond shall be payable to the city for the use and benefit of any person entitled thereto, and conditioned that the principal will pay all damages to persons or property caused by the applicant while conducting its operations. The bond shall remain in full force and effect for the duration of the permit and for two years thereafter.

Sec. 62-103(h). Same-Scope; transferability; increased fees for additional employees.

The permit of an applicant required by section 62-103(e) shall not be transferable from one applicant to another person or entity. It shall give authority for no more than one person to sell, lease, exhibit for sale or lease, offer for sale or lease or exhibit for the purpose of taking orders for the sale or lease of goods, merchandise or services, except that any applicant obtaining such permit shall be allowed two assistants, associates or employees and, in the event that the person receiving such permit employs or associates more than two assistants, associates or employees, the permit fee shall be increased by the sum of \$25.00 for each additional assistant, associate or employee.

Sec. 62-103(i). Same-Duration and display.

The permit required by section 62-103(e) shall expire on December 31st in the year of issuance, regardless of the date it was issued. The original permit shall be prominently displayed in a conspicuous place in the permitted location or with the applicant if there is no location but door-to-door solicitation only, and shall remain so displayed as long as any goods, merchandise or services are being sold, leased, or exhibited.

Sec. 62-103(j) Revocation.

Any permit issued under the provisions of this article may be revoked by the city for the violation by the permittee, assistants, employees or associated of any city ordinance, state law or parish.

Sec. 62-103(k). Occupational license required.

All peddlers and itinerant vendors, as the same are defined by the state revised statutes, shall obtain annually an occupational license, the fee for which shall be \$100.00.
