3. KAREN FONTENOT, FINANCIAL OFFICIER

3.1 Approval of July 2022 Financial Report

4. OTHER BUSINESS

4.1 District 49 State Representative Blake Miguez/Legislative Report
Representative Miguez gave a brief background about himself. He is from
Loreauville. He is a businessman, a father and a World Champion competitive
pistol shooter. He is Chairman of the House Republican Legislative Delegation,
and he is also on the Appropriation Committee. In the past 4 Legislative
Sessions they have addressed Re-Districting and also the Court Battle involving
the Congressional Districts. In the regular sessions, first time ever they ended up
with a budget surplus of 4.1 billion dollars extra revenue, which is helping with
different projects. The biggest is for the 500,000 million allocated for the bridge
and for Highway 90/I-49 which 203,000 million is allocated for. Right now, they
have 170,000 million in the rainy-day savings and 500 million in the
unemployment trust fund. There have been a lot of laws passed in congress: ROE
vs Wade was overturned and military veterans in good standing are now allowed
to conceal carry without approval. They do have a strong republican delegation.

4.2 Coulee Fortune Report

Walter did a presentation on the Coulee Fortune Project. Walter stated prior to the flood of 2016, Mayor Bourque was a Councilman at that time, and he formed Broussard's Council Drainage Committee. At that time Cypress Bayou Lateral was

the biggest drainage project done. Since 2016 we have done 3 million dollars of drainage improvements. Right now, we currently have 3 fulltime drainage crews. Ridgeview Outfall was completed last year, which was a huge drainage project. Coulee Fortune will be the biggest drainage project ever the city has undertaken. This project outfalls into the swamp at the Janin Farms. The biggest problem is to remove all the debris. It will be 21,500 linear feet and 4 miles of channel from the swamp to Morgan Street. It is within 1,110 residences that will be impacted, 200 businesses, 2,470 acres and 3.9 square miles and 10 crossings. They will start cleaning the channel and the areas to access it. It will model the entirety of the channel. Walter added that he doesn't ever remember the Janin Farms Channel ever being cleaned as long as he has lived here, which is 60 years. The Main Street structure downstream will be done in the Phase 3 Main Street project. Mel stated until recently the road was in the DOTD jurisdiction; it has since then been turned over to us. At the St. Des Porres bridge we will probably need a core permit for that area that also needs to be changed. The biggest part is cleaning out the vegetation. We allocated \$60,000 in the budget to rent equipment for this project. It should take approximately 6-8 months to get to Highway 90. We are setting the project up for the next steps. Mayor Bourque stated he feels the best way to handle this is for the city do this. The drainage problems we had in 2016 are because of lack of maintenance. Today Broussard is committed to improving drainage and we remain committed to improving drainage. Mayor Bourque stated he appreciates the councils supporting this project. Walter stated that maintenance need to be kept up. Mel stated we need to keep up with the maintenance each year, because that is what works well.
